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Drones: Gateway into Aviation

Drones often suffer misconceptions such as 'drones are toys' or 'drone pilots are not 'real' pilots,' says Aimee Mestre during her Innovation Education Session today. What is the real story? Commercial drone pilots are required to understand basic airman knowledge just like pilots and must pass the FAA exam. There is a whole world of drone users who are professional and who advocate aviation knowledge. Drones are at the forefront of deciding airspace usage rules that will lay the ground work for the future of three-dimensional air traffic. Why aren't we seeing this portrayed? Aimee believes this is because the aviation subculture is an enigma to the general public.

Aimee presents the thought-provoking quote, 'Introducing aviation concepts at all ages will lay the groundwork for aviation culture and etiquette in society.' She explains kids are part of the 'why' generation and we should make it easier for them to learn about aviation.

Leading an Engaged and Inspired Team

earn best practices for leading your team during this Career Education Session today featuring MaryAlice Gallagher and Modina Williams of The Boeing Company. Their panel discussion with three experts who are current or former Boeing leaders know how to lead an engaged and inspired team. The presentation and discussion centers around seven key characteristics: how to have successful teams, key employee engagement principles, what's an inspiring environment, leading an engaged and inspired team, removing barriers to an engaged workforce, changes when people return to the office, and setting up your team for becoming world class.

Throughout the discussion, MaryAlice and Modina share examples of companies who embody each of these elements ranging from Seattle's Pike Place Fish, Disney, Southwest Airlines, and even The Beatles!

The panelists agree keeping a workforce engaged while working virtually is a new challenge, and leaders are finding creative ways to keep in touch with their employees, and notice when employees are becoming disengaged. "It's about cooperation, not competitiveness to engage employees in the workforce," notes Tom Kulik who retired after 37 years at The Boeing Company and now is an adjunct Professor at Webster University and Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri.

With a shift in the workplace also comes a hyper focus on productivity. But Janet Aubuchon, Boeing's manager in integrated support management and service engineering,

notes, "Even when we were 'back in the office' pre-pandemic, my team was still spread across the county or across the campus. Things did not really change for my team, but until we talked about it, we looked at those out-of-state as virtual, but not those scattered across seven buildings." She adds, "the reality was, we were working virtually all along."

The panel concludes with some good tips for remote workers and how to better achieve work/life balance. Their advice includes taking breaks will make you more effective, follow a schedule (shut off your computer when your shift would have ended), keep a to-do list, eliminate distractions, and connect with co-workers to feel part of the team. —*Mary Woolf, WAI 45799*





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Free and Fun Virtual Girls in Aviation Day!

Girls in Aviation Day Reno from 10 a.m.-noon PST/ 1-3 p.m. EST, featuring Jasmin Moghbeli, NASA Astronaut, and the female members of the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds. Special interviews will introduce participants to the life of an astronaut and what it's like to prepare to travel to space, as well as learning about working for the elite air show demonstration team, the Thunderbirds.

Jasmin Moghbeli was selected by NASA to join the 2017 Astronaut Candidate Class. She reported for duty in August 2017 and having completed the initial astronaut candidate training is now eligible for a mission assignment. The New York native earned a bachelor's degree in Aerospace Engineering with Information Technology at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, followed by a master's degree in Aerospace Engineering from the Naval Postgraduate School. Jasmin is also a distinguished graduate of the U.S. Navy Test Pilot School and has accumulated more than 1,600 hours of flight time and 150 combat missions.

A unique look into the lives of an Air Force Demonstration Squadron is highlighted by interviewees Sarah and Veronica Hinesely asking questions of Maj. Michelle Curran and her crew Technical Sgt. Kristyne Pierson, and Staff Sgt. Jessica Englishbee. And for a look at nonpilot jobs, the Hinesely sisters also interview Capt. Katie Moorkamp, Staff Sgt. Stefanie Pascual, and Technical Sgt. Yuka Hareyama about their roles to support the F16 fleet and its squadron.

What is **Brain Power?**

Recognizing the different elements of human cognition and the impact on situational awareness, decision making, and communication are concepts detailed in today's Personal Development Education Session presented by Stacey Jackson, a pilot and president of Human Factors Aviation Solutions. Stacey notes while we all have bias, it's important to identify those personal shortcomings that prevent accurate information processing, recall, and evaluation. Additionally, Stacy shares different mitigation techniques to improve our situational awareness, information retention, and recall, communication and human factors-based leadership elements.

She begins by detailing the definition of cognition. Human cognition is the ability to perceive information, process it into coherent thoughts or ideas, then recall the information to be used. This is important because 80% of accidents and incidents are caused by a human decision or action/inaction. Understanding how your subconscious brain perceives and processes information allows you to make behavioral adjustments.



Stacey shows videos and takes the audience through activities to showcase how the brain performs in different ways. For example, stress, information overload or negative training can affect memory and recall. She shares mental models to assist in recall, but also provides guidance on how to share information to help others with recall.

What Is It Really Like to Be An Airline Pilot?

Today's Career Education Session moderated by Becky Howell, hosts a panel of six airline pilots where the conversation ranges from certifications and skills, to family life, to being women in a still male-dominated industry. The panelists careers span the past 41 years sharing the changes they have witnessed such as maternity leave. Some women were part of being the first women to go on maternity leave, and they had to write the policy on it.

Humble beginnings did not stop these women from becoming pilots. They worked odd jobs, sought support from family members, and kept their ears and eyes open for opportunities, then pursued those opportunities with vigor and sometimes dogged determination. Being a pilot has rewards and sacrifices. For all, their childhood dreams of traveling the world or being up in the sky came true, but also did tough decisions and balancing long-distance relationships or



Elevating your Authentic Presence, Communication, and Influence

Learn about the three pillars of communication during today's Personal Development Education Session presented by Stephanie Goetz. She encourages you to elevate your authentic presence, communication, and influence by learning more about each one. Stephanie explains the three pillars are: what you say, how you say it, and how you come across.

Encouraging each one of us to find our own voice, Stephanie also highlights it's the way YOU say things. Use kindness, directness, and clarity, and PRACTICE out loud at least three times before any presentation or talk. Remove filler words—it's better to slow down, pause, and allow your listeners time and space to receive what you're saying.

Presence is of key importance. It involves via body language, non-verbal traits, and how you make people feel. There are two key traits of exceptional leaders: warmth and strength. Assess yourself on how often you use each of these. Exuding these traits improves your ability to be an influencer.

How you come across matters because it is a window into who we are allowing others to decide to trust you. You will exude authenticity by living your life by design – not default. The decisions we make every day decide our path forward and who we want to become. Be intentional with what you want and what you don't want. Pursue what gives YOU life, joy and fulfillment. Be purposeful with relationships and connections. Live life by choice more than chance.

Who Are the Suff Birds?

S uff Birds tells the story of the Suffrage battle during 1909 to 1919. The women were not only fighting for the right to vote, but also for the right to fly. This historical aviation story is detailed during today's History Education Session by Terri Wesemann, aviation folklorist, who shares how the suffragists used consumer culture to help spread their message using printed media, film, and songs. The first female pilots moved this performance space into the skies as airplanes showed there were no boundaries. The Suff Birds were public relation pioneers spreading their suffrage message through the air while promoting aviation.

Terri highlights many women important to flight and the suffrage movement during this time. She explains the common patterns shared among early aviatrixes that helped them achieve their goals. The Suff Birds were raised in forward-thinking homes, encouraged to gain an education, and used the media to reframe their movement.

Fast forward to 2021. Terri underlines the need to continue educating girls thru STEM fairs and events like Girls in Aviation Day and to offer mentoring, internships, and scholarship opportunities for girls and women pursuing careers in the aviation industry. She adds joining professional groups like WAI, and using social media will help reframe the future of aviation.
